ABOUT THE SPEAKERS



Emerson B. Aquende

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Before joining the PCC on March 5, 2020, Commissioner Emerson B. Aquende led the Legal Education Board (LEB), the government agency regulating legal education in the country. He has gained experience in insurance and finance as board director in the United Coconut Planters Life Assurance Corp., UCPB General Insurance Co., Inc., and its various subsidiaries.

He practiced law as a litigation attorney, and has accumulated more than 22 years in the academe, 14 years of which as the law dean of the University of Santo Tomas-Legazpi. He also currently teaches law in the University of Philippines College of Law.

Kazuyuki Furuya is Chairman of the Japan Fair Trade Commission.

After graduating from the University of Tokyo, he joined the Ministry of Finance (MOF) in 1978. He has served in various important positions in the MOF and accumulated distinct experiences, especially in the budget and tax policy arena, including as Director-General of the Tax Bureau and Commissioner of the National Tax Agency. After serving as Assistant Chief Cabinet Secretary from 2013 to 2020, he assumed his current position in September 2020.



Tetsushi SonobeDean and CEO
Asian Development Bank Institute
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Tetsushi Sonobe is the Dean and CEO of the Asian Development Bank Institute (ADBI), the Tokyo-based thinktank of the Asian Development Bank that promotes the realization of a prosperous, inclusive, resilient, and sustainable Asia and the Pacific through policy research and capacity building. Born in 1960 in Tokyo, Dean Sonobe obtained his PhD in economics from Yale University and BA in economics from the University of Tokyo. His research interests include the empirics of economic development, particularly industrial development processes and poverty reduction in developing countries.

Dean Sonobe has more than 20 years' experience analyzing the role of human capital, institutions, and management in industrial development in Asia and other regions. Notably, he and prominent agricultural and development economist, Keijiro Otsuka, applied their unique enterprise survey approach to a series of development process case studies in different industries in East Asia. They expanded the scope of their industry study to cover South Asia, Africa, and Central America and conducted randomized controlled trials of management training programs for business owners and managers.

Before joining ADBI in April 2020, Dean Sonobe served for six years as a vice president of the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) in Tokyo. He also previously served as a professor of economics at Tokyo Metropolitan University and GRIPS. Dean Sonobe is a recipient of the Nikkei Book Publication Prize and the Masayoshi Ohira Memorial Prize, and a founding board member of the Japanese Association for Development Economics.

SESSION 1: THE EFFECT OF SUSTAINABILITY REGULATIONS ON COMPETITION POLICY 9:30-10:30

Some sustainability regulations may limit competition in certain markets. For instance, by limiting the use of coal and other fossil fuels in producing electricity, some power producers may be foreclosed from the market. In addition, subsidizing renewable energy may violate the concept of competitive neutrality. In this session, the panelists will comment on how aiming for sustainability can affect competition.

SESSION 2: THE INTERFACE BETWEEN COMPETITION POLICY AND PRIVACY LAWS 11:00-12:00

The rapid growth of digital business interactions has posed new challenges to governments and regulatory authorities, largely because these platforms cut across the previously well-established boundaries of markets, jurisdictions, and regulations. Given this, policy areas that were previously considered separate have now become interlinked, and regulatory agencies must consider policy objectives that may contrast with their own. This session in particular aims to shed light on the interplay of competition policy and privacy regulation in the digital era. In many circumstances, the objectives of promoting competition and protecting personal data overlap, however, this may not always be the case. This session will center around the issues surrounding the intersection of these two regulations and opportunities to address these issues.

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Ms. De Vera is currently a Senior Lecturer at the University of the Philippines College of Law, handling courses in Political Law and Commercial Law (JD Program) and Comparative Competition Law (LLM Program). She is the Program Director of the Competition Law and Policy Program (CLPP) of the University of the Philippines Law Center. The UPLC-CLPP is intended to support the legal and institutional framework for competition policy in the country and serve as a platform for developing research and advocacy in competition law and policy in the Philippines and the region and a forum for academics, practitioners, and enforcement officers in the field of competition. Since 2019, she has also been serving as assistant to the Dean in relation to student affairs. She previously served as Assistant Professor at the College of Law, where she started as a Senior Lecturer in 1997, and later served as Director of the UPLC Institute of International Legal Studies from 2008 to 2011.

Ms. De Vera joined the Philippine Competition Commission in 2017 as its first Executive Director. Prior to the passage of the Philippine Competition Act, she worked on antitrust and competition issues in various sectors, including pharmaceuticals and energy. She has experience in advisory, transactional and litigation work in both the private and public sectors, as partner at Puyat Jacinto & Santos (PJS Law) where she leads teams in Infrastructure, Regulatory and Compliance, as well as Arbitration. Prior to joining the Philippine Competition Commission, she served as the Dean of the Manuel L. Quezon University School of Law.

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Scott has held the Chief Executive Officer role (previously Chief Operating Officer) at the ACCC since April 2020, following a career dating back to 1996 when he joined the agency as a graduate.

The CEO is the ACCC's senior management position, leading the executive leadership team and managing the day to day operations of the ACCC, its people and resources. Scott ensures the organisation's structure and processes meet its strategic and cultural needs, and, along with the Chair and Commissioners, represents the ACCC and provides strategic direction on high profile or complex matters.
